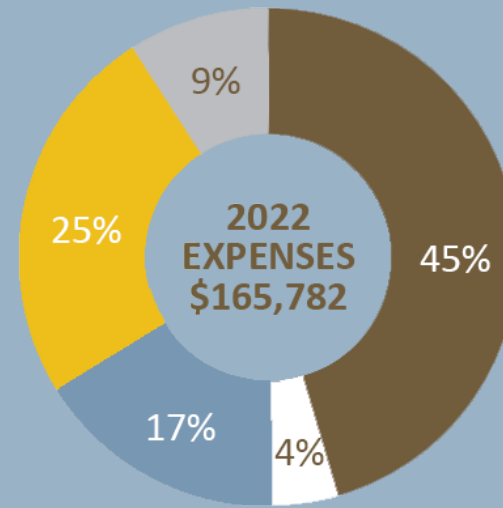
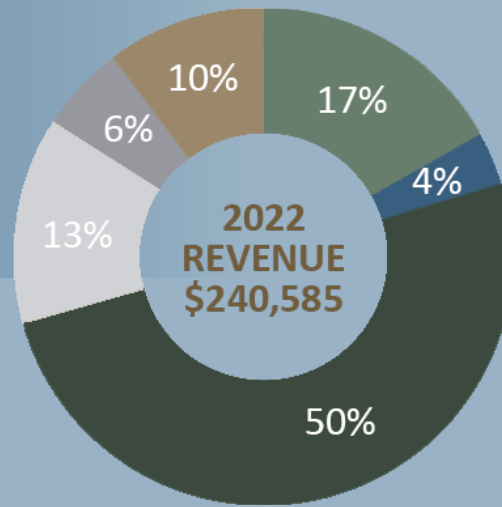

LIFETIME LEGACY AWARD

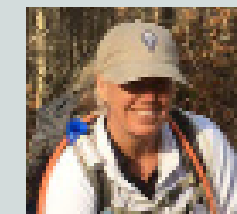
KATHIE BRENNAN

GREAT AMERICAN OUTDOORS ACT

As we close out the first two years of the GAOA funding, we were able to touch "every section of the Ozark Trail within the MTNF." Significant work was completed by volunteers alongside AmeriCorps and OTA trail crew members that were hired to lead and develop GAOA-specific projects. Totals across the 364 miles include 192 miles assessed of the 364 miles with plans to assess the remaining miles in the next two years. With 49 construction and maintenance events, a total of 49.5 miles of trail received heavy maintenance including tread restoration and trail re-alignments. Among other GAOA projects, deferred maintenance was performed at various trailheads across the Forest. Thanks in part to successful implementation of the GAOA funding and the efforts by OTA members, the Ozark Trail will continue to be the beneficiary of additional funding through 2024 to address additional deferred maintenance.
