See the Capitol Christmas Tree on Nov. 20 in Columbia, MO

ROLLA, Mo. (Nov.3 2016) – Every year, a majestic tree from America's public lands is selected to adorn the U.S. Capitol's lawn in Washington D.C. This year, that tree is coming from Payette National Forest in Idaho and will be on display for visitors in Missouri at several locations. The City of Columbia and the Mark Twain National Forest, which manages 1.5 million acres of public land in Missouri, will proudly host an event for the public to see the tree for themselves at the Holiday Inn Executive Center in Columbia, MO on Nov. 20 from 1:00 p.m.to 3:00 p.m.

The Capitol Christmas Tree is fun for all ages to view. The Mark Twain National Forest and the USFS Northern Research Station will have representatives available at the event to share information about the benefits public lands provide—recreation, clean water, firewood, and so much more. The Ozark Trail Association and the Show Me Missouri Back Country Horsemen will also be there to talk to people about the great volunteer work they have accomplished; and they can connect anyone interested in helping keep trails maintained and waterways free of trash with future volunteer opportunities. University of Missouri Center for Agroforestry will be roasting chestnuts for visitors as well!

Along with the truck carrying the Capitol Christmas Tree, the Big Idaho Potato Truck will also be onsite. This truck travels the country promoting the certified hearthealthy Idaho Potato and its mission to help small charities with its A Big Helping program.

The 2016 U.S. Capitol Christmas Tree is an 80 foot Engelmann spruce, a native tree species from the Payette National Forest. This year's tree meets all the requirements–65 to 85 feet tall, having full branches around the entire tree, having a rich green color and a cylindrical shape. The tree will begin its 3,900 mile, cross-country journey from the Payette National Forest on November 5. The tour will start with a community celebration in McCall, Idaho and travel to several cities in Idaho before starting its nation-wide tour on November 15. More than 25 community celebrations are being planned, culminating with the official tree lighting in early December.

The Nov. 20 event will take place in the parking lot of the Holiday Inn Executive Center, 2200 Interstate 70 Dr. SW, Columbia, MO. Parking for the event will be in the northwest parking lot off of Hutchens Dr. and Interstate 70 Dr. SW (just south of I-70 at exit 124).

Attachment 2 – Granger-Thye Agreement with USFS for OTA House

OPERATING PLAN SPECIAL USE PERMIT - POT22803 Ozark Trail Association

This operating plan is an agreement between the USDA Forest Service and the Ozark Trail Association on the use of the rangers dwelling at the Potosi Ranger Site. This site will be used as an office by the Ozark Trail Association.

This permit is under the Granger-Thyme authority. The fee for the permit will be waived as the Ozark Trail Association is a non-profit entity and they partnership with the Forest Service to maintain trails on National Forest Land. Reference fee waivers in FSM 2709.11, section 31.22b.

The utilities will be paid by the Ozark Trail Association.

The association will be financially responsible for all repairs (major or minor), maintenance and cleaning. This will include:

- 1. Paint basement area and finish outside painting, including exterior support columns and gutters and downspouts.
- 2. Replace and paint soffit and fascia, as needed.
- 3. Power wash and stain/seal cedar siding on back porch.
- 4. Cleaning of guttering as needed.
- 5. Patch holes in basement ceiling to restore fire barrier, including laundry chute.
- 6. Install outlet cover for garage door opener and remove unguarded electrical fixture or replace with guarded fixture.
- 7. Remove kitchen exhaust fan and fix hole.
- 8. Remove and replace kitchen carpet with vinyl or linoleum.
- 9. Install exterior lighting along exterior back walkway/stairs.
- 10. Install emergency fixtures throughout structure. (Exit signs-fire extinguishers)
- 11. Trimming of shrubs and trees near the house as needed.
- 12. Air conditioning and heating maintenance as needed.

- 13. Routine maintenance as needed.
- 14. Develop and submit a plan for the grounds of the property including the damaged chain link fence.

At times, the OTA may be required to allow others working for the Forest Service to occupy the dwelling on a temporary basis; however, OTA will not be responsible for any damages or liability due to negligence on those occupying the building on behalf of the Forest Service.
